




Global Development

- Global partnership is the link that drives development for achieving the global agenda such as the MDGs




Global Development Partnership with UN Habitat




Informal settlements

- Traditional cadastral systems do not provide for security of tenure in informal settlements. A more flexible system is needed for identifying the various kind of social tenure existing in informal settlements.
- Such systems must be based on a global standard and must be manageable by the local community Itself.
- FIG cooperates with UN-Habitat, ITC and the World Bank to develop the STDM model that is design as a basic tool for poverty alleviation.






What We Have Done

Workshop Output




- Tool Agreed: Participatory forward planning to prevent informal settlements
