Mutual Recognition

- FIG Publication No. 27 (2002):
 - Mutual recognition is a process which allows the qualifications gained in one country to be recognsed in another country
 - Recognition does not relate to "getting a job"
 - Recognition may relate to becoming a member of the professional association of the host country
 - Recognition becomes important when a foreigner wants to practise - setting up a company - in the host country
 - Recognition becomes crucial when a foreigner wants to practise within a licensed area - e.g. cadastral surveys - in the host country

- Institutional capacity development


Typically mutual recognition is already technically operational think engineering surveys, companies working internationally
